

# **VOTER TURNOUT FOR GENERAL ELECTION 2014**

Following are the results of the November 4, 2014 Texas General Election. 33.37% of registered voters (4,681,406 voters) cast ballots. That compares to:

- 2012 turnout 58.37% (13,646,226 voters)
- 2010 turnout 37.47% (4,972,895 voters)
- 2008 turnout 59.37% (8,053,036 voters)
- 2006 turnout 33.64% (4,399,068 voters)
- 2004 turnout 56.56% (7,410,749 voters)
- 2002 turnout ~ 36.24% (4,553,979 voters)
- 2000 turnout 51.81% (6,407,637 voters)

Note: 104 Precincts out of 8,453 total precincts are still not reported.





# **GENERAL ELECTION RESULTS SUMMARY**


## STATEWIDE

Republicans again won all statewide offices on the ballot. Democrats have not held a statewide office in Texas since 1994. That is the year that George W. Bush defeated Governor Ann Richards. Even though the Republicans captured the governorship in 1994, four Democrats were elected statewide: Lt. Governor Bob Bullock, Attorney General Dan Morales, Comptroller John Sharp, and Land Commissioner Garry Mauro, and they were the last Democrats elected to statewide office in Texas. 2014 has been an historic election year in Texas because of the record number of open statewide seats (no incumbent). Excluding Supreme Court and Court of Criminal Appeals races, seven of the eight statewide races were open this year. The only statewide incumbents seeking re-election were U.S. Senator John Cornyn and Lt. Governor David Dewhurst. Dewhurst was defeated in the Republican Primary Run-off. *Note: 104 precincts are still not reported. They will not change the outcome of any of the races.* 

### U.S. Senate

Senator John Cornyn (R-Austin) won re-election with 61.58% of the vote over Democrat David Alameel of Dallas (34.34%). Libertarian Rebecca Paddock of Garland had 2.87% of the vote, Green Party candidate Emily "Spicybrown" Sanchez received 1.17%, and Write-In candidate Mohammed Tahiro took 0.02%.




### Governor

Attorney General Greg Abbott (R-Austin) will replace Rick Perry as Governor of Texas. Abbott won with 59.28% of the vote to Democrat Wendy Davis' 38.88%. Libertarian Kathie Glass received 1.40%; Green Party candidate Brandon Parmer had 0.39%; and Write-In Sarah M Pavatt took 0.02%.



# Lt. Governor


Senator Dan Patrick (R-Houston) who defeated Lt. Governor David Dewhurst in the Republican Primary Run-off will succeed Dewhurst as Lt. Governor. Patrick defeated Democratic Senator Leticia Van de Putte 58.16% - 38.68%. Libertarian Robert D. Butler received 2.55%, and Green Party candidate Chandrakantha Courtney took 0.59%.






# **Attorney General**

Senator Ken Paxton (R-McKinney) won the race to replace Greg Abbott as Attorney General by defeating Democrat Sam Houston 58.84% to 37.99%. The Libertarian, Jamie Balagia, and Green Party candidate, Jamar Osborne got 2.53% and 0.63%.



# Comptroller


Senator Glenn Hegar (R-Katy) was elected comptroller with 58.39% of the vote. Democrat Michael Collier of Kingwood received 37.66%; Ben Sanders (L-Irving) had 2.96% and Deb Shafto (G-Houston) had 0.97%. Hegar will replace Comptroller Susan Combs, who did not seek re-election.






# **Land Commissioner**

George P. Bush (R-Fort Worth), son of former Florida Governor Jeb Bush and nephew of former President George W. Bush won the Land Commissioner post with 60.88%% of the vote over Democrat John Cook (35.30%), Libertarian Justin Knight (2.71%), and Green Party candidate Valeria Alessi (1.28%).






# **Agriculture Commissioner**

Sid Miller (R-Stephenville) won the race to replace Todd Staples as Agriculture Commissioner with 58.63% of the vote. Democrat Jim Hogan got 36.80%; Libertarian David "Rocky" Palmquist received 2.87%; and Green Party candidate Kenneth Kendrick took 1.68%.



## Railroad Commissioner

Ryan Sitton (R-Houston) defeated Steve Brown (D-Missouri City) with 58.31% of the vote to Brown's 36.49%. Libertarian Mark A. Miller got 3.15% and Green Party candidate Martina Salinas took 2.02%.





## **Texas Supreme Court**

### **Chief Justice**

Justice Nathan Hecht (R-Austin) won re-election with 59.61% of the vote over Democrat Bill Moody of El Paso (37.33%) and Libertarian Tom Oxford of Beaumont (3.05%).

### Place 6

Republican Justice Jeff Brown of Houston received 60.34% of the vote to win a full term on the court. He defeated Democrat Lawrence "Larry" Meyers, who received 36.46%. Meyers was elected to the Court of Criminal Appeals as a Republican, then switched to the Democratic Party on December 9, 2013 to run for Supreme Court. Meyers will remain on the Court of Criminal Appeals through 2016. Libertarian Mark Ash got 3.18% of the vote.

### Place 7

Justice Jeff Boyd (R-Austin) was re-elected with 58.92% of the vote by defeating Gina Benavides (D-McAllen), Don Fulton (L-Trophy Club), and Charles E. Waterbury (G-Dallas), who received 37.56%, 2.75%, and 0.74% respectively.

# **Court of Criminal Appeals**

## Place 3

Republican Bert Richardson defeated Democrat John Granberg 59.85% to 36.52%. Libertarian Mark Bennett received 3.61% of the vote.




# TEXAS CONGRESSIONAL DISTRICTS

Currently, there are 36 members of the Texas congressional delegation. All 36 were up for re-election this year, but only 22 incumbents had major party general election opposition. All but one of the 22 incumbents with major party opponents won re-election. Congressman Pete Gallego (D-Alpine) was defeated by Will Hurd (R-Helotes) in Congressional District 23. *Election returns for Congressional Districts* 1. 13. 15. 23. and 34 are still not complete. See notes below.

# Partisan Makeup

Currently there are 24 Republicans and 12 Democrats in the Texas Delegation. That partisan split in 2015 will be 25 Republicans and 11 Democrats.

Congressman Louie Gohmert (R-Tyler) easily defeated his Democratic challenger Shirley J. McKellar (D-Tyler)77.69% to 23.30%. *Note: Three precincts out of 272 total precincts have still not reported. Two of them are in Harrison County and one is in Smith County. They will not change the outcome of the election.* 

## Congressional District 2

Congressman Ted Poe (R-Humble) got 67.96% of the vote over Niko Letsos (D-Houston), who received 29.61%. Libertarian James B. Veasaw of Kingwood got 1.54; and Green Party candidate Mark Roberts took 0.87%.

# **Congressional District 6**

Congressman Joe Barton (R-Ennis) got 61.15% of the vote to defeat Democrat David Cozad of Arlington (36.43%), and Hugh Chauvin, the Libertarian candidate, who received 2.40%.

# **Congressional District 7**

Congressman John Culberson (R-Houston) won re-election with 63.27% of the vote over Democrat James Cargas, a Houston attorney, who took 34.52%; and Libertarian Gerald Fowler, who got 2.19%.

# **Congressional District 10**

Congressman Michael McCaul (R-Austin) again defeated his 2012 Democratic opponent Tawana Walter Cadien 62.17% to 34.13%. Libertarian Bill Kelsey took 3.68%.

# **Congressional District 12**

Congresswoman Kay Granger (R-Fort Worth) got 71.31% of the vote to beat Democrat Mark Greene, a Fort Worth consultant, who received 26.3%. Ed Colliver, the Libertarian candidate received 2.38%.

# **Congressional District 13**

Congressman Mac Thornberry (R-Amarillo) won with 84.33% of the vote over Democrat Mike Minter (12.78%); Libertarian Emily Pivoda (2.17%); and Green Party Candidate Con Cook (0.70%). Note: One precinct out of a total of 384 precincts has still not reported. The missing precinct is in Collingsworth County. It will not change the outcome of the election.



Congressman Randy Weber (R-Pearland) won a second term in Congress by defeating Democrat Donald G. Brown 61.84% to 36.07%. Libertarian John Wieder received 2.08%.

## **Congressional District 15**

Congressman Ruben Hinojosa (D-Mercedes) won with 53.65% of the vote over Republican Eddie Zamora of Edinburg (43.59%). Johnny Partain, the Libertarian, got 2.75%. Note: Ten precincts out of a total of 297 precincts have still not reported. The missing precincts are all in Brooks County. They will not likely change the outcome of the election.

## **Congressional District 16**

Congressman Beto O'Rourke (D-El Paso) won a second term with 67.48% of the vote. He defeated Republican Corey Dean Roen, who got 29.17%. Libertarian Jaime O. Perez had 3.34%.

# **Congressional District 17**

Congressman Bill Flores (R-Bryan) was re-elected with 64.56% of the vote over Democrat Nick Haynes of Waco (32.39%) and Libertarian Shawn Michael Hamilton of Hewitt (3.03%).

# **Congressional District 18**

Congresswoman Sheila Jackson Lee (D-Houston) got 71.78% of the vote to again easily defeat her 2012 opponent, Republican Sean Seibert, who got 24.75%. Green Party candidate Remington Alessi got 1.22%; and Independent Vince Duncan took 2.22%.

# **Congressional District 19**


Republican Congressman Randy Neugebauer of Lubbock won with 77.16% of the vote over Democrat James Neal Marchbanks of Lubbock (18.36%); Libertarian Richard "Chip" Peterson (4.41%); and Write-In Donald L. Vance (0.04%).

# **Congressional District 22**

Congressman Pete Olson (R-Sugarland) won another term in Congress with 66.55% of the vote over Democrat Frank "Chip" Briscoe who received 31.55%. Libertarian Rob Lapham got 1.88%.



In the hottest Congressional contest in Texas, Congressman Pete Gallego (D-Alpine) was defeated by Republican Will Hurd of Helotes 47.66%% to Hurd's 49.78% with Libertarian Ruben Corvalon taking 2.54%. *Note: One precinct out of 334 precincts is still not reported. It is in Crockett County. It is not likely to change the outcome of the election.* 



# **Congressional District 24**

Congressman Kenny Marchant (R-Coppell) defeated his Democratic challenger Patrick Fabian McGehearty 65.07% to 32.28%. Libertarian Mike Kolls got 2.64%.

# **Congressional District 25**

First-term Congressman Roger Williams (R-Weatherford) defeated Democrat Marco Montoya of Austin 60.22% to 36.23%. Libertarian John Betz got 3.54%.

# Congressional District 27

Congressman Blake Farenthold (R-Corpus Christi) won a third term with 63.58% of the vote over Democrat Wesley Craig Reed, an airline pilot and Marine Corps Reservist from Corpus Christi, who took 33.70%. Libertarian Roxanne Simonson took 2.71%.



Congressman John Carter (R-Round Rock) easily won his re-election contest with 64.05% of the vote over Democrat Louie Minor of Belton (31.95%) and Libertarian Scott J. Ballard (3.98%).

# **Congressional District 32**

Congressman Pete Sessions (R-Dallas) was re-elected with 61.81% of the vote over attorney Frank Anthony Perez (D-Garland) who got 35.44%. Libertarian Ed Rankin received 2.73%.

## **Congressional District 34**

First-term Congressman Filemon Vela (D-Brownsville) got 58.36% of the vote to defeat Republican Larry S. Smith of Nordheim, who received 39.70%. Ryan Rowley, the Libertarian candidate, had 1.93%. *Note: 73 precincts are still not reported out of 254 total precincts. They are all in Cameron County. They are not expected to change the outcome of the election.* 

# **Congressional District 35**

Congressman Lloyd Doggett (D-Austin) again defeated his 2012 Republican challenger Susan Narvaiz, former Mayor of San Marcos, 62.48% to Narvaiz' 33.29%. Libertarian Cory W. Bruner received 2.87%; and Green Party candidate Kat Swift took 1.34%.

# **Congressional District 36**

In the race to replace Congressman Steve Stockman, who ran for U.S. Senate against Senator John Cornyn in the Republican Primary, Republican Brian Babin, a Dentist from Woodville defeated Democrat Michael Cole of Orange 75.97% to 22.04%. Libertarian Rodney Veach had 1.46% and Green Party candidate Hal J. Ridley, Jr. took 0.51%.




## **TEXAS SENATE**

The Texas Senate has 31 members. Since Senate members serve staggered fouryear terms, only 15 of the 31 Senate members were up for re-election in 2014. Of the six incumbent Senators that had major party opposition, all won re-election.

# Partisan Makeup

The Senate currently has 19 Republicans and 12 Democrats. In 2015, the Senate will have 20 Republicans and 11 Democrats because the Republicans picked up the Senate District 10 seat being vacated by Senator Wendy Davis (D-Fort Worth). Democrats will still have the 11 votes they need to block bills from Senate consideration under the 2/3rds rule.

# **Special Election**

Senator Glenn Hegar (R-Katy), who is in the middle of a four-year term, was elected Comptroller. He will resign his Senate seat in District 18 and the Governor will call a special election to fill his unexpired term.

#### Senate District 5

Senator Charles Schwertner (R-Georgetown) won re-election with 64.98% of the vote over his Democratic challenger, Joel Stephen Shapiro of Cedar Park, who got 31.22%. Libertarian Matthew Whittington pulled 3.79%.

#### Senate District 7

Senator Dan Patrick (R-Houston), who is moving up to Lt. Governor will be replaced by former Harris County Tax Assessor-Collector Paul Bettencourt (R-Houston). Bettencourt won with 71.82% of the vote over Democrat Jim Davis of Spring, who received 26.28%. Libertarian Whitney Bilyeau got 1.88%.


#### Senate District 9

State Representative Kelly Hancock (R-North Richland Hills) won a second term in the Texas Senate with 65.07% of the vote by defeating Democrat Gregory Perry, who got 34.92%.



### Senate District 10

In race to replace Senator Wendy Davis (D-Fort Worth) who was the Democratic nominee for Governor, Konni Burton (R-Colleyville) reclaimed the district for the Republicans with 52.83% of the vote over Democrat Libby Willis, who received 44.71%. Libertarian Gene Lord took 1.84% and Green Party candidate John Tunmire had 0.60%.



### Senate District 15

Senator John Whitmire (D-Houston) will return as Dean of the Senate. He got 59.16% of the vote to defeat Republican Ron Hale (38.48%) and Libertarian Gilberto Velasquez, Jr. (2.35%).

### **Senate District 17**

Senator Joan Huffman (R-Houston) won with 63.34% of the vote over Democrat Rita Lucido (33.90%), Libertarian George Hardy (2.02%), and Green Party Candidate (0.72%).



## Senate District 23

Senator Royce West (D-Dallas) got 79.39% of the vote to win a re-match with Bishop John Lawson (R-Dallas), who got 18.84%. Libertarian Jonathan Erhardt took 1.76%.

# Senate District 25

Senator Donna Campbell (R-New Braunfels) won a four-year term in the Texas Senate by defeating Democrat Daniel Boone of Canyon Lake 65.15% to 31.82%. Libertarian Brandin P. Lea of Austin got 3.01%.




## TEXAS HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES

All 150 members of the House were up for election in 2014. 91 House incumbents had no major party opposition. Of the 35 House incumbents with major party opposition, all but 2 won re-election. Representative Philip Cortez (D-San Antonio) and Representative Mary Ann Perez (D-Houston) were defeated.

## Partisan Makeup

The Texas House currently has 95 Republicans and 55 Democrats. In 2015, the House will have 98 Republicans and 52 Democrats.

# Special Election(s)

Representative Mike Villarreal (D-San Antonio) is expected to resign to run for Mayor of San Antonio. The governor will call a special election to replace him in House District 123. Also, Representative Lois Kolkhorst (R-Brenham) is expected to run in the special election in Senate District 18 to replace Senator Glenn Hegar. If she wins that special election for the Senate, a special election will be required to replace her in House District 13.



State Representative John Raney (R-Bryan) easily won his re-election by getting 68.08% of the vote over Democrat Andrew Metscher, who got 28.48%, and Libertarian Bruce L. Pugh, who received 3.43%.

## **House District 16**

In the race to replace Representative Brandon Creighton (R-Conroe), who moved up to the Texas Senate, Republican Will Metcalf, a Conroe banker, had a convincing 83.79% General Election win over Democrat Michael Hayles, Sr. (13.65%) and Libertarian Bob Townsend (2.55%). Metcalf also won the Special Election to fill Williams' unexpired term with 85.17% of the vote.

### **House District 17**

Representative Tim Kleinschmidt (R-Lexington) won a fourth term in the Texas House by defeating Democrat Carolyn Banks of Bastrop 64.62% to 35.37%.

#### **House District 20**


First-term Representative Marsha Farney (R-Georgetown) won re-election to the House with 73.33% of the vote over Democrat Stephen M. Wyman of Georgetown, who received 22.73%, and Libertarian Jarrod Weaver, who took 3.93%.

#### **House District 21**

Representative Allan Ritter (R-Nederland) did not seek re-election. Republican Dade Phelan, a commercial real estate developer from Beaumont will replace him. Phelan won the general election with 74.38% of the vote over Democrat Gavin Bruney of Nederland.



Representative Craig Eiland (D-Galveston) did not seek re-election. Former Dickinson City Council member Wayne Faircloth (R-Dickinson) got 54.60% of the vote to win this seat for the Republicans. The Democratic candidate, Susan Criss, a former District Court Judge in Galveston County received 45.39%.



### **House District 26**

First-term Representative Rick Miller (R-Sugar Land) got 69.68% of the vote to win re-election over Democrat Amber Paaso.

### **House District 27**


Representative Ron Reynolds (D-Missouri City) won a third term in the Texas House with 66.97% of the vote over Republican David Hamilton of Missouri City.

### **House District 41**

Representative Bobby Guerra (D-Mission) won re-election to the House with 57.46% of the vote over Elijah Israel Casas (R-McAllen).

### **House District 91**


